"What is an SSL certificate?

An SSL certificate is a digital certificate that authenticates a website's identity and enables an encrypted connection. SSL stands for Secure Sockets Layer, a security protocol that creates an encrypted link between a web server and a web browser.

Companies and organizations need to add SSL certificates to their websites to secure online transactions and keep customer information private and secure.

In short: SSL keeps internet connections secure and prevents criminals from reading or modifying information transferred between two systems. When you see a padlock icon next to the URL in the address bar, that means SSL protects the website you are visiting." Source: www.kapersky.com

Advice from Rocketfuel, "The 'not secure' message is due to the site not having an SSL Certificate installed, which is pretty standard (but not mandatory) on all websites these days. I did suggest to someone that the site should have it a few years back but I don't think I heard back.

The cost to have the SSL Certificate installed is £49.99 + VAT per year. I can arrange this for you if you give me the go ahead."
